And leave the rest to the Lord. It is not faith, nor dogmatics, nor mysticism, nor ascetism, nor fasting, nor long prayers, but love that makes one a true Christian. Everything becomes pointless without this fundamental thing - love for our neighbor.

Abba John the Dwarf said, 'There was a spiritual old man who lived a secluded life. He was held in high estimation in the city and enjoyed a great reputation. He was told that a certain old man, at the point of death, was calling for him, to embrace him before he fell asleep. He thought to himself, if I go by day, men will run after me, giving me great honour, and I shall not be at peace in all that. So I will go in the evening in the darkness and I shall escape everyone's notice. But lo, two angels were sent by God with lamps to give him light. Then the whole city came out to see his glory. The more he wished to flee from glory, the more he was glorified. In this was accomplished that which is written: "He who humbles himself will be exalted." ' (Luke 14:11)

Welcome to all those visiting St. John Orthodox Church. We are honored by your presence. It is our sincere desire that your participation today in the Divine Liturgy will draw you closer to Christ and His Church.

These can be perplexing to the uninitiated eye. Rest assured that everything we do has a solid biblical foundation and a long history among Christian people. The Orthodox Church understands the Eucharist, or Lord's Supper, to be – among other things – the paramount expression of Christian unity. While it is our deepest hope that Christendom will one day fulfill Christ's desire for true unity among all those who claim His name (John 17:21), the unfortunate reality of our day is that the various segments of Christendom are not unified with the historic Orthodox faith. Since participation in the Eucharist expresses a unity with all the dogma and practice of the Orthodox Church, non-Orthodox guests do not receive Holy Communion. The Holy Eucharist is reserved for those members of the Orthodox Church who have prepared themselves by prayer, fasting, and recent confession. All visitors and unprepared Orthodox are invited to partake of the blessed bread as they come forward to venerate the cross at the end of the Liturgy. Thank you for your understanding.

LIBRARY LINES

Many, even in the Christian tradition, feel uncomfortable thinking about Christ as the Great Judge, but our Church gives us this day, the Sunday of the Last Judgment, to focus our attention on this event. Fr. Alexander Schmemann reminds us in his book *Great Lent* (CAT LTHW SCH) that Christ will judge us on our love for others. Today is also called Meatfare, because it is the last day we will eat meat until we break our fast for Pascha.

St. Gregory (3/12) the Dialogist and Pope of Rome was descended from a family of saints. He reluctantly accepted the office of bishop of Rome, considering himself unworthy. He used his excellent education in service of the Church. He authored the *Commentary on the Book of Job* and compiled the *Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts* in Latin. His *Pastoral Rule* describes the role of a true pastor. He was given the title *Diologius* for his work on the Italian Fathers.

Saint Benedict (3/14) was born in Italy in the fifth century. He studied in Rome as a teenager but was troubled by the immorality of the city and left to live in asceticism. His pious life drew many disciples, and he settled them into twelve communities. His monastic order brought some critics, so he moved his monks and founded a monastery which became a theological center for the Western Church. The Rule of St. Benedict was based on the lives and counsels of the desert fathers and St. John Cassian (2/29). It ordered obedience, the renunciation of personal possessions, and manual labor. Older monks preserved the writings from early Christianity and instructed the younger monks. The head (igumen) of the monasteries taught and explained the Faith to the others. He asked advice from the experienced monks but made the final decisions. St. Benedict died in 547. We owe much of our knowledge of his life from the second *Dialogue* of St. Gregory the Great. Children will enjoy reading about him and his sister in *Holy Twins* (KID STS BEN).
