Welcome to all those visiting St. John Orthodox Church. We are honored by your presence. It is our sincere desire that your participation today in the Divine Liturgy will draw you closer to Christ and His Church.

If you are from a non-Orthodox background you may see new things such as icons, incense, the sign of the cross, the veneration of saints, and a great deal of standing. These can be perplexing to the uninitiated eye. Rest assured that everything we do has a solid biblical foundation and a long history among Christian people. Please feel free to participate where you feel comfortable and feel equally as free only to observe when you prefer.

The Orthodox Church understands the Eucharist, or Lord's Supper, to be – among other things – the paramount expression of Christian unity. While it is our deepest hope that Christendom will one day fulfill Christ's desire for true unity among all those who claim His name (John 17:21), the unfortunate reality of our day is that the various segments of Christendom are not unified with the historic Orthodox faith. *Since participation in the Eucharist expresses a unity with all the dogma and practice of the Orthodox Church, non-Orthodox guests do not receive Holy Communion.* The Holy Eucharist is reserved for those members of the Orthodox Church who have prepared themselves by prayer, fasting, and recent confession. All visitors and unprepared Orthodox are invited to partake of the blessed bread as they come forward to venerate the cross at the end of the Liturgy. Thank you for your understanding.



## Library Lines

Today we commemorate one whose blessing is invoked in the Orthodox wedding service. St. Procopius (7/8), a soldier during Emperor Diocletian's reign, encountered Christ in a conversion experience similar to the Apostle Paul's. The authorities tortured him and threw him in prison. One day twelve women approached his window, told him they were also servants of Christ and were locked up with him. He taught them more about the Church, especially receiving the crown of martyrdom. According to *The Prologue*, this is why he and the God-crowned Emperor Constantine and Empress Helen are mentioned in the marriage service.

Today also we remember St. Prokopios of Ustag (7/8). He is one of a long list of saints called Fools for Christ. These men and women engaged in strange behaviors and feigned mental instability to achieve humility through the ridicule of others. Most of them lived in Russia. Look on the bulletin board for Met. Kallistos Ware's article, "The Fool in Christ as Prophet and Apostle." Read more about this form of asceticism in his book, *The Inner Kingdom* (CAT GEN WAR) and in chapter 4 of *The Freedom of Morality* (GEN YAN) by Christos Yannaros.

This week and next, we honor two members of a royal family, Olga (7/11), princess of Kiev and her grandson, Great Prince Vladimir of Kiev, equal-to-the-Apostles (7/15). St. Olga ruled Kievan Rus as regent for her son. Tradition says she craftily conquered a city with the help of sparrows and pigeons. She is credited for instituting the first legal reforms in Eastern Europe. Upon her baptism, she took the name of Helen, after St. Helen who found the True Cross. She was the first Russian ruler to become a Christian and built many churches in the cities where she established and fortified administrative and cultural centers. See *Halia's Wooden Cross* (KID STS OLH) for a good children's book on her life, and "Saint Olga, Princess and Evangelizer" in *The Handmaiden*, winter 2007, p. 48.

St. Euphemia the All-praised (7/11) is best known for a miracle occurring after her death. The Fourth Ecumenical Council was held in a church which housed her relics. It was convened to establish the nature of Christ. The Monophysites opposed the doctrine of His two natures, divine and human, asserting Jesus was divine and not human. The Patriarch proposed that the two views be written down, St. Euphemia's tomb opened and the scrolls placed on her bosom. This was done, and the tomb was then sealed and guarded by the emperor's soldiers. After three days of prayer and fasting, the tomb was opened. The scroll of the Orthodox confession was in her right hand and that of the heretics was at her feet. Her story is recorded in *The Encyclopedia of Major Saints and Fathers*, (HAG - - - ELE), p. 34 and in *Orthodox Saints* (HAG - - - POU), on p. 135 in the blue book and on pp. 25 and 199 in the yellow book. She is also commemorated September 16.
