While it is our deepest hope that Christendom will one day fulfill Christ's desire for true unity among all those who claim His name (John 17:21), the unfortunate reality of our day is that the various segments of Christendom are not unified with the historic Orthodox faith. *Since participation in the Eucharist expresses a unity with all the dogma and practice of the Orthodox Church, non-Orthodox guests do not receive Holy Communion.* The Holy Eucharist is reserved for those members of the Orthodox Church who have prepared themselves by prayer, fasting, and recent confession. All visitors and unprepared Orthodox are invited to partake of the blessed bread as they come forward to venerate the cross at the end of the Liturgy. Thank you for your understanding.

<u>LIBRARY LINES</u> -

Tuesday is the commemoration of the translation of the relics and canonization of St. Herman (8/9) of Alaska. He was born into a family of merchants and began the monastic life at age 16. In 1794 he arrived in Kodiak, Alaska and in the early 1800s he established a monastery on Spruce Island which he called New Valaam. He lived a hard and simple life, serving the Aleuts with a selfless love. Children will enjoy the colorful pictures when they read about him in *North Star, St. Herman of Alaska* (KID STS HER), *Saint Herman of Alaska* (KID STS HER), and *Journey Across North America* (KID STS GID). Adults will also find spiritual food in *The Little Russian Philokalia*, vol. 3, which is a collection of the saint's wisdom. Also, take a look at "Holy Father Herman" in *Life Transfigured*, Nativity 1998, p. 10, at "Orthodox Missions: Lessons From the Past" in *Orthodox America*, Nov-Dec 1993, p. 5, and at *Herman*, a Wilderness Saint (HAG HER KOR).

Six more times this week we commemorate the translation or uncovering of the relics of saints. We honor this event for Sts. Metrophanes, Zosomos and Sabbatius of Solovki, Maximus the Confessor, Maximus of Moscow, and Tikhon of Zadonsk. So what's so important about it? *The Oxford Dictionary of the Christian Church* (HIS CRO) donates a page to the practice of honoring relics. Interestingly enough, it is a wide spread event, even practiced in Buddhism and is "based on the natural instinct of men to treat with reverence what is left of the dead they loved." A more readable explanation is given in *The Pearl* by Michael Whelton. (CAT GEN WHE) Chapter VI gives us his answers to questions frequently asked by Protestants, or former ones like most of us. His concise answer concerning relics begins on page 139. Kallistos Ware connects this practice with the theology of the body in *The Orthodox Church* (CAT GEN WAR). See chapter 11. See also *Holy Relics* by T. L. Frazier (CAT SPEC FRA).

St. Matthias (8/9) is sometimes thought of as an extra apostle, a last minute fill-in. We remember that he was chosen "by lot" so he may seem like one who was chosen by chance. But, we know that there are no coincidences in the Kingdom of God. Unlike many of the Twelve who were uneducated, common men, St. Matthias studied under the hand of holy Symeon, the God-receiver.

The Prophet Micah (8/14) was a contemporary of the Prophet Isaiah. He gave us the prophecy that Bethlehem would be the birthplace of the Savior. His relics were uncovered in the fourth century A. D. through a revelation to a bishop.

If you are fascinated with icons, this is your month! All during the Dormition Fast, we have looked to the Theotokos as our icon for our own deaths. During the month of August, we commemorate many icons of her. Read more about them in *Icons of the Most Holy Theotokos and Ever Virgin Mary* (ART ICO KHO). Saturday (8/13) we remember the icon of the "Seven Arrows". It was lying face-down in a bell tower and mistaken for a floor board. It was discovered when a peasant has a vision before it of being healed.

PERIODICALLY SPEAKING

How many times last weekend did you kiss someone's hand and give him strange-sounding greetings??? If you're new around here, just watch someone and do what he does. That's how many of us figure out things in Church, like kissing the priest's or a bishop's hand. Find the summer, 2002 issue of *The Veil* and look on page 24. This article in the column, "On Good Order in Church", tells us why we continue this ancient practice and when it should be done. The column appears in every issue and addresses all those little things that no one ever explains to you when you're new.
