Welcome to all those visiting St. John Orthodox Church. We are honored by your presence. It is our sincere desire that your participation today in the Divine Liturgy will draw you closer to Christ and His Church.

If you are from a non-Orthodox background, you may see new things such as icons, incense, the sign of the cross, the veneration of saints, and a great deal of standing. These can be perplexing to the uninitiated eye. Rest assured that everything we do has a solid biblical foundation and a long history among Christian people. Please feel free to participate where you feel comfortable and feel equally as free only to observe when you prefer.

The Orthodox Church understands the Eucharist, or Lord's Supper, to be - among other things – the paramount expression of Christian unity. While it is our deepest hope that Christendom will one day fulfill Christ's desire for true unity among all those who claim His name (John 17:21), the unfortunate reality of our day is that the various segments of Christendom are not unified with the historic Orthodox faith. Since participation in the Eucharist expresses a unity with all the dogma and practice of the Orthodox Church, non-Orthodox guests do not receive Holy Communion. The Holy Eucharist is reserved for those members of the Orthodox Church who have prepared themselves by prayer, fasting, and recent confession. All visitors and unprepared Orthodox are invited to partake of the blessed bread as they come forward to venerate the cross at the end of the Liturgy. Thank you for your understanding.

### **LIBRARY LINES**

Which Ecumenical Council do we honor today??? Hint: It's the one that many would say defines the Orthodox Church in the world's eyes. Also, it's the one we honor on the Sunday of Orthodoxy. In 787, the Fathers of the Seventh Ecumenical Council (10/15) decreed that the icons were not idols and veneration of them was honorable. Thank God for these holy men. See the stories of the Councils in *The First Seven Ecumenical Councils* (HIS DAV), *Foundations of Social Order* (HIS RUS), and *The Ecumenical Synods of the Orthodox Church* (HIS THO).

Several of the saints actively opposed Christianity before their conversion. Monday we honor St. Longinus (10/16), the centurion who stood at the foot of the Cross. Tradition says that he was cured of an eye ailment when water and blood poured out of the wound inflicted by him in Christ's side. He was later baptized by the Apostles and martyred by Pilate.

Once again we commemorate the translation of a saint's relics. This time it's for the Righteous Lazarus (10/17). He lived thirty years after Christ called him forth from the tomb and his relics were discovered in a marble coffin inscribed with the words, "Lazarus of the four days, the friend of Christ." They were transferred to Byzantium around the year 900. Read more about Christ raising him in *The Resurrection and the Icon* (ART ICO QUE). See also *Holy Relics* (CAT GEN FRA) for more on the veneration of relics.

The Prophet Hosea (10/17) lived in the 9<sup>th</sup> century B.C. and was a contemporary of the Prophets Isaiah, Micah and Amos. Besides warning the Jews of their captivity by the Assyrians unless they repented of their sins, he foretold the end of sacrifices and the priesthood as they knew it. He also prophesied Christ's resurrection and triumph over death.

St. Luke (10/18) is a well-known and much-loved apostle. He shows us the Beauty of our Church in words and in images. However, few may realize that He was one of the Seventy. He wrote two books of the Bible, accompanied St. Paul on his journeys, and painted the first icons of the Mother of God. St. John Library owns five books on his works: *Commentary of the Gospel of Luke* (REF PAT CYR), *Exposition of the Holy Gospel According to St. Luke* (PAT AMB), *Explanation of the Holy Gospel According to St. Luke* (REF PAT THE), *Acts* (SCR COM CRO), and *Commentary on the Acts of the Apostles* (REF PAT BED). See *Meet the Evangelists* (KID STS KHO), *The Lives of the Holy Apostles* (REF HAG - - - HOL) and *Notes on the Holy Apostles* (REF HAG - - - MAS) for details about his life.

Who is a constant source of comfort when our non-Orthodox relatives die? St. Varus (10/19) is much loved and prayed-to saint in our parish. He was a Roman soldier in Egypt and a secret Christian. He joined a band of martyrs being encouraged by them, much like the 40 martyrs of Sebaste. His relics were rescued by a pious widow, and St. Varus appeared to her at her son's death. He is a saint who intercedes for the souls of our relatives outside the Church.
