...a man surrounded by the frailty of the flesh cannot cling totally to God or be joined to Him in unbroken contemplation. Yet we certainly need to know the direction in which our mind must always go. We must be aware of the destination toward which we must always summon our spirit. And whenever the mind can succeed in this let it rejoice, and whenever it is distracted let it grieve and sigh, knowing that as often as it is turned aside from contemplation it has been cut off from the ultimate good, knowing that to veer for even a moment from beholding Christ is to be guilty of impurity. When our gaze has wandered even a little from Christ let us immediately turn the eyes of our heart back to Him and let our vision be directed to Him as though along the straightest line.

One and the same grace is from the Father in the Son, as the light of the sun and of the radiance is one, and as the sun's illumination is effected through the radiance; and so too when he prays for the Thessalonians, St. Paul in saying, 'Now God Himself even our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ, may He direct our way to you' (I Thes. 3:11), has guarded the unity of the Father and of the Son. For he has not said, 'May they direct,' as if a double grace were given from two Sources, This and That, but 'May He direct,' to show that the Father gives it through the Son.

Since participation in the Eucharist expresses a unity with all the dogma and practice of the Orthodox Church, non-Orthodox guests do not receive Holy Communion. The Holy Eucharist is reserved for those members of the Orthodox Church who have prepared themselves by prayer, fasting, and recent confession. All visitors and unprepared Orthodox are invited to partake of the blessed bread as they come forward to venerate the cross at the end of the Liturgy. Thank you for your understanding.

The NATIVITY FAST began November 15.

The Nativity Fast grows in strictness as the Nativity approaches. From November 15th through December 12th the traditional fasting discipline (no meat, poultry, eggs, dairy, fish, wine and oil) is observed with katalysis (relaxation of the fast) for fish, wine and oil on every day except for Wednesdays and Fridays. From December 13th to 19th, the katalysis is only for wine and oil on Tuesday and Thursday and fish, wine and oil on Saturday and Sunday. From December 20th through 24th the traditional discipline is observed with katalysis for wine and oil only on Saturday and Sunday.

LIBRARY LINES

The prophet Obadiah (11/19), a faithful servant of God, was a steward in the house of the idolatrous King Ahab. Obadiah healed one of three groups of soldiers sent by Queen Jezebel to arrest the Prophet Elias. Heavenly fire consumed two of the detachments, but Obadiah and his men were spared through the intercession of Elias. Thereupon, Obadiah resigned his position and became a disciple of the Holy Prophet. His life is recounted in the first and second books of Kings, and his prophecy is included in the Minor Prophets in the Old Testament. Read more about him in *Lives of the Holy Prophets* (REF HAG HOL).

Tuesday we commemorate the Entry of the Theotokos into the Temple (Nov 21). Many of us came from backgrounds in which this feast was not only entirely unknown but also unimaginable. The High Priest, by the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, led her into the Holy of Holies, much to the astonishment of all. After her Presentation in the Temple, the Theotokos lived there until her adulthood. She, along with others who were dedicated to the service of the Lord, lived in quarters set aside for them. St. Jerome says that how she spent her time is known only to God and the Archangel Gabriel. But, Tradition says she and the other virgins prayed, read Scripture and engaged in needlework. The Church has celebrated this feast since the first centuries A.D. Read more about her and this feast in *The Entrance of the Theotokos into the Temple* (KID CHU ELA), *The Illustrated Life of the Theotokos* (KID STS MAR), *The Story of Mary, the Mother of God* (KID STS MAR), *The Life of the Virgin Mary* (REF HAG - - - HOL), and the many other books on her life in St. John Library.

Wednesday, we honor another apostle. Philemon was one of the Seventy, and he and his servant, St. Onesimus, were recipients of the Epistle *Philemon* from St. Paul. The apostle and his wife, Apphia, offered their house to the Christian community as a meeting place for the church. They met a martyr's death during the persecution of Nero.

From early childhood, St. Katherine (11/25) was recognized for her intellect and was instructed by her mother's spiritual father. When grown, she refused marriage and sought to unite herself to her heavenly Bridegroom. She boldly and eloquently defended her Faith before Emperor Maximian, was tortured and martyred in 305 with 200 others who professed Christ because of her courageous testimony.
