### From the Fathers (and others):

St. John Chrysostom says of the wonderful Christian heroine and Saint Thekla: "It seems to me that as I see this blessed virgin, in one hand she offers Christ virginity, and in the other hand, martyrdom."

#### St. Silouan the Athonite:

It takes neither money nor reputation to come to know God, but only humility.

If you are forgetful of the Lord, you will not pray, and without prayer, the soul will not dwell in the love of God, for the grace of the Holy Spirit comes through prayer. Prayer preserves a man from sin.

Do not murmur, O children of God, because you find life difficult. Only wrestle with sin and entreat help from the Lord, and He will hearken, for He is full of compassion and loves us.

To possess grace, a man must be temperate in all things - in his gestures, in speech, and in what he lets his eyes look upon, in his thoughts and in the food he eats. And every form of temperance is furthered by meditation in the word of God. It is written, 'Man doth not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceeds out of the mouth of the Lord.'

The spirit of the Saints burned with an ardent flame and not only did not become extinguished by the wind of temptations, but burned with even greater force. They walked upon the earth with their feet and labored with their hands, but their spirit dwelt unceasingly with God, and their minds did not want to be detached from the remembrance of God.

Many rich and powerful men would pay dearly to see the Lord or His Most Pure Mother, but God does not appear in riches, but in the humble heart... Every one of the poorest men can be humble and come to know God. It need neither money nor reputation to come to know God, but only humility.

Beware of these two thoughts, and fear them. The first suggests 'you are a saint;' the other, 'you will not be saved.' Both come from the enemy, and there is no truth in them. Instead, think to yourself, 'I am a great sinner but the Lord is merciful. He loves with a great love, and will forgive me my sins.' Believe in this way, and, you will see, the Lord will forgive you. But put no faith in feats of your own, however, much you may have striven...God has mercy on us, not for our achievements but freely, because of His goodness.

If you would know of the Lord's love for us, hate sin and evil thoughts, and day and night pray fervently. The Lord will then give you His grace, and you will know Him through the Holy Spirit, and after death, when you enter into paradise, there too, you will know the Lord through the Holy Spirit, as you knew Him on earth.

Welcome to all those visiting St. John Orthodox Church. We are honored by your presence. It is our sincere desire that your participation today in the Divine Liturgy will draw you closer to Christ and His Church.

These can be perplexing to the uninitiated eye. Rest assured that everything we do has a solid biblical foundation and a long history among Christian people. Please feel free to participate where you feel comfortable and feel equally as free only to observe when you prefer.

The Orthodox Church understands the Eucharist, or Lord's Supper, to be – among other things – the paramount expression of Christian unity. While it is our deepest hope that Christendom will one day fulfill Christ's desire for true unity among all those who claim His name (John 17:21), the unfortunate reality of our day is that the various segments of Christendom are not unified with the historic Orthodox faith. Since participation in the Eucharist expresses a unity with all the dogma and practice of the Orthodox Church, non-Orthodox guests do not receive Holy Communion. The Holy Eucharist is reserved for those members of the Orthodox Church who have prepared themselves by prayer, fasting, and recent confession. All visitors and unprepared Orthodox are invited to partake of the blessed bread as they come forward to venerate the cross at the end of the Liturgy. Thank you for your understanding.

#### LIBRARY LINES

Today we commemorate the Saints of Alaska (9/24). A very readable account of the history of Orthodoxy in our northernmost state can be found in Michael Oleksa's *Orthodox Alaska* (HIS OLE). He begins showing us the model for missions with the story of Sts. Cyril and Methodius and their conviction that its goal has to be the "incarnation of the Logos of God into the language and customs of a country," and the "growth of an indigenous Church which will sanctify and endorse the people's personality." Fr. Michael relates the Alaskan culture and Russian Orthodoxy and goes on to tell the story of some of the saints we honor today. See also *The Orthodox Church in Alaska* (HIS OLE) and *Everyday Wonders* (HIS OLE).

Secular literature tells many tales of women who disguised themselves as men to accomplish some purpose that would be otherwise denied them. Even Christians have done so. St. Euphrosyne (9/25) was born into a pious family in Alexandria in the fifth century. After her father arranged a marriage for her, she donned men's clothing and ran away from home to pursue her desire for monasticism. She told the monks she was a eunuch named Smaragdos. After living there thirty-eight years, she revealed her identity to her grieving father who was still searching for her.

Monday we also commemorate a saint whose story appeals to children and adults. St. Sergius of Radonezh (9/25) was given the name Bartholomew at his birth in 14th century Russia. He loved the Church and the beauty of God's world; however, he hated school because he could not learn to read. In answer to his prayers, God sent an angel to him in the form of an old monk. He gave a piece of prosphora to the boy to eat as a sign of God's gift of knowledge and understanding. Immediately he could read with ease and comprehension. When he grew to manhood, he was tonsured as a monk. He went on to establish over 40 monasteries and, along with St. Seraphim of Sarov, he is one of Russia's most beloved saints. *The Wonderful Life of Russia's Saint Sergius of Radonezh* (KID STS RAD) relates his story in poetic form along with bright colorful icon style illustrations.

Tuesday we celebrate the repose of our patron, St. John the Evangelist. We remember many events of his life from the Scriptures but his last days are less familiar to us. Under Nero's orders he was sent to Rome to stand trial for being a Christian. He was given poison to drink and was put into a pot of boiling oil. God preserved him, and John was banished to the island Patmos along with his disciple Prochorus. Besides performing many miracles there, he wrote the Book of Revelation, also known as the Apocalypse, as well as his Gospel and Epistles. When approaching his death at over 100 years old, he asked his disciples to dig his grave in the shape of a cross. He was the only Apostle who was not martyred. Read more about him in *Meet the Evangelists* (KID STS KHO) and *Disciples of Christ* (KID STS SPR).

We remember St. Wenceslaus at least four times during the year. A couple of weeks ago we commemorated his grandmother St. Ludmilla. We sing about him at Christmas and remember him on the feast day (12/27) of St. Stephen. Thursday (9/28) is his own feast day. Read about him in *Good King Wenceslaus* (KID STS WEN).
